How's your vision?

One woman laughs about the time she took her 14-year-old daughter and her daughter's best friend to a Peter, Paul and Mary concert. They were all fans of "oldies" music from the 60's and 70's and felt lucky to get front row seats. When they returned home, her daughter said, "During the show, we looked back and saw hundreds of little lights swaying to the music. At first we thought the people were holding up cigarette lighters. Then we realized that the lights were the reflections off all the eyeglasses in the audience." (Thanks to Reader's Digest)

My eyesight isn't what it used to be, either. But as Helen Keller (who could neither hear nor see) said, "The greatest tragedy in life is people who have sight but no vision." Maybe I should be more concerned with my vision than with my eyesight.

There are numerous stories of people who lacked vision. Like Orville and Wilbur Wright. On December 17, 1903, they had finally succeeded in keeping their homemade airplane in the air for 59 seconds. Immediately, they rushed a telegram to their sister in Dayton, Ohio, telling of this great accomplishment. The telegram read, "First sustained flight today fifty-nine seconds. Hope to be home by Christmas."

Upon receiving the news of the successful flight, their sister was so excited that she rushed to the newspaper office and gave the telegram to the editor. The next morning the newspaper headed the story: "Popular Local Bicycle Merchants To Be Home For Holidays." The hapless editor saw what was obvious, but missed the real story.

Vision is never about seeing the obvious. It's about looking ahead; about seeing what is not there -- YET. It's often about seeing the potential behind the obvious.

Like the potential in people. Spotting the potential for success in a student who, as is obvious to everyone else, will likely fail.

Or recognizing the potential for something good to come from a situation others are writing off as lost.

If we want to see what is really going on, we will need to learn to spot what is not there, then act on it.

So... your eyesight may be perfect, but how's your vision?

What is Holy Week?

Holy Week is the last week of Lent, the week immediately preceding Easter or Resurrection Sunday. It is observed in many Christian churches as a time to commemorate and enact the suffering and death of Jesus through various observances and services of worship. While some church traditions focus specifically on the events of the last week of Jesus' life, many of the liturgies symbolize larger themes that marked Jesus' entire ministry. Observances during this week range from daily liturgical services in churches to informal meetings in homes to participate in a Christian version of the Passover Seder.

Evangelical churches are now realizing the value of Holy Week services, especially on Good Friday. This has a solid theological basis both in Scripture and in the traditions of the Faith. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German theologian who was executed by the Nazis, wrote of the Cost of Discipleship and warned of "cheap grace" that did not take seriously either the gravity of sin or the radical call to servanthood: "When Jesus bids a man come, he bids him come and die."

It is only in walking through the shadows and darkness of Holy Week and Good Friday, only in realizing the horror and magnitude of sin and its consequences in the world incarnated in the dying Jesus on the cross, only in contemplating the ending and despair that the disciples felt on Holy Saturday, that we can truly understand the light and hope of Sunday morning!

The entire week between Palm Sunday and Holy Saturday is included in Holy Week, and some church traditions have daily services during the week. However, usually only Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday are times of special observance in most churches.

Here at Calvary United Methodist Church, the opportunities to observe this powerful week is as follows:

Holy week begins Sunday March 20th with Palm Sunday, remembering Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, the crowd waving Palm Branches and shouting "Hosanna!" We will worship at our regular times of 8:15 AM and 11 AM with Sunday school at 9:30 AM.

This will be followed by a Maundy Thursday service at 7 PM on March 24th, to remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples before his arrest and crucifixion. The youth will present a dramatic reading called "Two Faces in the Shadows" and there will be a foot washing for those interested.

Good Friday service and Cross Walk: On March 25, we have been invited to participate in Affirmation Church's Cross Walk in the community which will end up on Calvary's church grounds at 6:45 PM for a brief Good Friday Service. Time and place to gather for the walk is yet to be announced. We need interested people to help carry the cross (less than 2 miles), as Jesus would have done, as a testimony to the world about his sacrifice. Look for more details regarding where and when the walk will begin. Even if you can't participate in the walk, come out for the service on the grounds at 6:45 PM. Let Pastor Esther know if you have any questions.

Easter Day, March 27th, will begin with a sunrise service at 7 AM on the lawn followed by breakfast. Sunday school will be from 9-10 AM and worship will begin at 10:30 AM where the Chancel Choir will present the Cantata "He Is Risen Indeed," under the direction of Andy Haney.
